Palm Institute

Palm has indeed made great progress in our quest to train ethical and excellent leaders in Africa.

Today is a typical example. The Institute was founded in September, 2012 and began academic teaching and learning in 2014 with 11 students, 8 faculty members and three diploma programs in Business Administration, Computerized Accounting and Banking Technology and Accounting – affiliated to the National Board for Professional and Technician Examinations (NABPTEX). We later added two diploma programs in Procurement and Materials Management and Agribusiness and Finance.

Between September 2012 and August 2018, we were operating from rented facilities in East Legon, Okponglo Junction to be precise.

As a result of our quest to introduce HND and Degree programs, we had to leave that location mostly because the National Accreditation Board for three consecutive years rejected our buildings in East Legon. Miraculously, the NAB approved of our new campus location as a suitable location for tertiary education this past October, 2018. We are therefore going through the required processes to mount our HND and Degree Programs as a university-college.

This new facility houses 5 Lecture Halls, 6 Administrative Offices, a Large Faculty Area, a Computer Lab, a Kitchen & Cafeteria, a Library, an Infirmary.

Hostels & Faculty Residence:

We have as part of our short-term plans to build hostels and a faculty residence to house our students and faculty on campus.

I strongly believe this will help facilitate effective teaching and learning at Palm and will help drive the Palm Vision of "Educating Ethical and Excellent Leaders in Africa."

I would therefore like to call on all stakeholders and investors who believers in the Palm vision of raising ethical and excellent leaders in a conducive liberal arts environment to partner with us to construct our first hostel and faculty residence.

As a growing private liberal arts university-college, we will steadily work towards growing whilst keeping the needs of Ghana and Africa in mind. We will endeavor to expand our facilities and tactically add relevant programs to our menu of programs to diversify what we offer to our clients.

We will not relent in our pursuit of giving our students the most convenient environment for teaching and learning. We will not look to the left or right in our commitment to educating ethical and excellent leaders in Africa.

I will now turn my attention to our dear Class of 2018.

Class of 2018, as you leave Palm today stepping into the world, some of you will establish your own companies, others will start working for companies and various organizations. Some of you will pursue further education and other exciting journeys.

As a result, you will find yourself working with diverse individuals, teams and groups. My advice to you is to consciously strive live a life of **Self-discipline**. Your commitment to a **life of discipline** will make a difference in the trajectory of your life and the people you interact with. It will determine your **level of success or failure in life**.

Class of 2018, thousands of books and articles have been written and published on the subject of **success and achievement**. It appears as though the reason for these accomplishments have been discussed and written for thousands of years in every imaginable way. However, one quality that most philosophers, teachers, experts and professionals agree on is the importance of **self-discipline** when it comes to the subject of **success and achievements**.

Class of 2018, Self-discipline is the key to **personal greatness**. It is the magic quality that opens all doors for you and makes everything else possible. With self-discipline, the average person can rise as far and as fast as her talents and intelligence can take her.

Class of 2018, I would like to leave you with the words of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.:

Dr. King, in his speech to a group of students in Barrat Junior High School in Philadelphia on the October 26, 1967 encouraged the students to have a "Life Blueprint."

Dr. King told them that before a building is constructed, an architect is engaged to draw a blueprint, and that blueprint serves as a pattern and a guide, and that a building is not well constructed without a good, solid blueprint.

Dr. King told the students that each of them is in the process of building the structure of their lives and the question he posed to the students was whether they have a solid and sound blueprint for their lives.

I know without a shadow of a doubt that each of you seated before me today is in the process of building the structure of your life.

Dr. King suggested two things that should begin their life's blueprint which I would like to share with you.

He said:

- Number one in your life's blueprint, **should be a deep belief in your own dignity, your worth and your own "somebodiness.**" He said, "don't allow anybody to make you feel that you are nobody. Always feel that you count. Always feel that you have worth, and always feel that your life has ultimate significance.
- Number two, in your life's blueprint you must have as the basic principle the determination to achieve excellence in your various fields of endeavors. He said, you are going to be deciding as the days and the years unfold what you will do in life. what your life's work will be. And he said, "Set out to do it well."

Therefore, Class of 2018, as you step out of Palm today, I would like to encourage you be determined to grow great by staying focused and dedicated no matter what comes your way.

Seek to design and build a blueprint of self-worth, dignity and excellence. But above all, strive to live a life of self-disciplined.
